3. Included on this web site will be a monthly bulletin board that will be used to post all Dixie District shows, quartet appearances and any other activities that would be




of interest to our membership. All news items and postings for the bulletin board should be sent to me or to **Ron Hesketh** for publication. I will have more to say about the web site as development progresses.

5. *Rebel Rouser* publication dates will be on the 15th of February, May, August and November. All submissions need to be in the hands of the editor one month in advance. Your thoughts and input regarding this policy are always welcome.

Well, that is enough for any sane member to digest at one sitting, barbershoppers included. With these changes being implemented over the course of this year, we hope to make this our best year ever in the Dixie District.

DIXIE DISTRICT HALL OF FAME By Bill Lester

The purpose of the Dixie District Hall of Fame is to give recognition to those men who have made exceptional, long standing, unselfish, dedicated and devoted contributions to the Dixie District, their Chapter(s) and the Society. This award shall serve to honor such person's participation and focus on these activities.

QUALIFICATION

Induction into the Hall of Fame shall be limited to persons, living or dead, whose contributions to the District has spanned no less than 10 years. These contributions may have been on various levels of organization whether musical or administrative. These contributions shall be service or activities which have added to the overall well-being of the District and furtherance of the hobby. Recognition need not be limited to current Society members, but the recognized service must have been performed while the individual was a member of the Society and the District.

The basic criteria for qualification includes, but is not limited to, quarteting activities, chorus directing, coaching, contest judging, composing, arranging, publishing, administering, writing, promoting, teaching, philanthropy, or preferably some combination of these, which shall be marked by unselfish, dedicated and devoted service.

NOMINATIONS

Nomination of persons for induction into the Hall of Fame shall be made by any member of the District and shall be made in writing to the District Historian between April 1 and June 30 of any year. The initiating nominator shall provide a legible, detailed description of the nominee's qualifications. Such description need not be precise on dates, places, results, etc. but must provide sufficient credible information to substantiate the qualification offered. Corroborating sources, such as publications or individuals, may be used, but such must be either generally available or made available by the nominator. A specific person may be nominated more than once. If someone is nominated by more than one person, it shall be treated as a single nomination, but the combined facts and information may be considered. A quartet may be nominated, but it shall be considered as one nomination.

SELECTION PROCEDURE

The Committee shall review the information by mail.As soon as practical after June 30 of each year, the District Historian shall send to the Chairman of the Hall of Fame Selection Committee all of the nominations and supporting documentation. The Selection Committee Chairman shall review all of the nominations to determine the eligibility of each nominee. Questions regarding eligibility shall be referred to the Chairman of the Dixie District Laws and Regulations Committee. The nominations of all eligible nominees shall constitute the slate of potential inductees for that year. The members of the Selection Committee may wish to discuss the nominees' qualifications before voting. Voting shall be by written ballot and shall be by rank.

For example each voting member shall list his first, second, third, and successive choices. After the order of ranking is determined by the vote of the Selection Committee, the Committee shall determine how many nominees shall be inducted for that year. The final selection vote may be by telephone poll, by mail or email, or, at the request of any member of the Selection Committee, shall be by written ballot. The Committee's action each year shall be completed by August 15th.

The Dixie District extends this invitation for you to submit your nomination, to the Dixie District Hall of Fame, for evaluation and consideration by the Selection Committee .


SEND A KID TO THE DLHW HARMONY CAMP IN 2001.

The DLHW Youth Camp at Clemson University this year will feature quartet and ensemble coaching in addition to the Harmony Camp Chorus segment which is always popular.

All activities will be conducted on the Clemson University campus. The registration desk is in LEVER HALL, a 10story dormitory near the Tilman clock tower off South Palmetto Blvd. Check-in time is between 3pm and 6pm on July 20th.

The University emergency phone # is 864-656-2075; in the event you need to be located, a runner will be sent to find you.

The **Harmony Camp Chorus** (HCC), student foursomes and ensembles will be invited to perform on the Saturday evening show which is open to the public and very popular;



uniform for the show will be jeans and white shirt.

The student tuition fee for the weekend is \$70.00. For groups of 10 or more students sponsored by the same chorus or attending from the same High School, the rate is \$60 per student. The fee provides double room accommodations, 3 meals on Saturday, breakfast on Sunday, a Pole Cat songbook, HCC sheet music, admission to the Saturday evening show and a Saturday Night Pizza Social. The sheet music will be delivered well in advance of the Camp so that students can commit the selections to memory before arrival.

Students are asked to register before June 24th after which there is a \$10.00 late fee assessment.

Both male and female teachers as well as students are invited to the DLHW. Teachers in attendance will receive full scholarships (room, board and classroom supplies will be provided). Teachers can register on the Harmony Camp Registration form; just fill in the pertinent sections and check off the Music Educators (M/E) box on the first line. Upon registration the M/E's will receive a curriculum package from which they can (1) select DLHW coursework, (2) elect to monitor Harmony Camp Chorus rehearsals and classes, (3) elect to monitor quartet and ensemble coaching sessions or (4) opt for some combination of (1), (2) & (3).

SPRING, 2001 CHAPTER SPOTLIGHT The Golf Capitol Chorus Pinehurst, North Carolina

The SPEBSQSA chapter in Pinehurst, North Carolina is known to its members, friends and patrons as "The Golf Capital Chorus".

The group's organizational meeting and first rehearsal was held on January 12,1981. We were licensed by SPEB-SQSA on March 16, 1981 and received our Articles of Incorporation from the State of North Carolina on August 17, 1981. The goal of all this paper chasing was realized when we received our chapter charter from Kenosha on August 17, 1981. In the meantime the members of the chorus were working to produce and present their first annual show, which they did on October 31.

It does not take a deal great of complicated computations to determine that the show, which we presented on November 4. 2000, was our twentieth annual endeavor. In our program for this

show, our members sold over \$13,000 worth of advertisements (that's right thirteen thousand dollars!). We also sold more than 1,300 tickets for the show, which featured our chorus and the 2000 gold medal quartet "**Platinum.**" This truly championship caliber quartet not only thrilled our concert audience but delivered an equally medal worthy performance at the afterglow.

While we have enjoyed several recent successes both musically and

financially, our two-decade existence has not been a perpetual bed of roses. In our earliest years just finding enough bodies to keep the organization together and musically viable was often a struggle.

For several years we could regularly count on the support of only a single tenor. In spite of our early modest membership, the greater Pinehurst area continued to enthusiastically support our annual November shows and numerous charitable performances in area nursing homes and hospitals.

Thanks to this local community support, the chapter developed and has been able to maintain a gold medal level of contributing to local charities and Heartspring.

Between our 1985 and 1986 annual concerts, chapter president Vince convinced time Kaptur long barbershopper and Raleigh, North Carolina resident Paul Conway that he had a mission to fulfill by becoming our musical director. For Paul it has meant a 90-minute drive one way, at least once each week and sometimes more often when major concerts or sing outs were on our agenda. Paul's dynamic leadership abilities as well as the commitment to growth shared by our members have enabled us to become the sixth largest chapter in the Dixie District.

In recent years our reputation as an organization willing and able to provide top quality entertainment has expanded beyond our local Sandhills region of North Carolina. In 1999 we traveled to the state capitol in Raleigh and in the Civic Center entertained more than 1000 employees of the area's major public utility at a company recognition gala.

In 1999 and 2000, we journeyed to Fayetteville, North Carolina to sing for several civic and professional organizations. At the moment, we are investigating the possibility of providing the entertainment for a charitable fund raising event in Rockingham, North Carolina.

Since our humble beginnings, the fact that we have raised over sixty thousand dollars for charity is clearly our most satisfying achievement. Our motto as we begin the third decade of our existence is:

"Small is beautiful but larger is more harmonious."

y the time this article reaches you, we will have all made (and forgotten?) our New Year's resolutions. Right now, however while I'm writing the article—most of us are resolving to be better people, to be more considerate spouses and more effective parents, to be more diligent in attending to religious and civic obligations, and to be more effective and productive in our careers.

Conscientious barbershoppers are resolving to improve vocal techniques and to perfect memorization of our chorus and quartet repertoires. They are resolving (I hope) to preserve and improve their chapters and the Society by recruiting new members. We walked to a restaurant near the meeting place where we gave an impromptu performance (which the patrons thoroughly enjoyed), and then returned to the meeting site for more singing and fellowship. What a great time we had! Each of these chapters profits from the proximity of the other.

By the time you read this article, most of us will have forgotten most of our resolutions, or we will have decided to put most of them aside for a while. Right now, as I write, it is only January 2, and I have already begun rethinking my plans for self-improvement. Instead of working out with weights and spending time on my exercise bike today, I think that I'll start next Monday. 
THE STANDING OVATION PROGRAM

n recent years, our Society has developed a program through which quartets and choruses can obtain a voluntary review with recommendations for improving

future performances so as to enhance their quality. The program is called "The Standing Ovation." It is available through the District Vice President of Music and Performance. The ideal venue for a review would be a chapter show or performance.

This is <u>not</u> designed to be a contest-like evaluation, since the intent is to assist groups in enhancing their overall performances and increasing the level of positive response from their audiences. The reviewer,



selected for his barbershop experience and expertise, attends the performance and gives attention to all facets of the presentation, from music selection and quality of singing to entrance and exit, costuming, technical matters and overall entertainment value. The SOP reviewer then completes a review form, which is given to the performing



group, and offers recommendations for improvement and training opportunities. No copies of the review are distributed.

There is normally no cost to the chapter except a reserved seat for the reviewer and a friend. Reviewers are expected to be within reasonable driving distance from the venue, and travel expense will be covered by the District.

This program can be of immense value to the chapters, which have not regularly gone the competition route, but is also a very helpful tool for those who have. Consider this a "call" to all chapter Music & Performance VPs, or whoever is in charge of your annual shows, other public performances, etc. If you would like a "Standing Ovation" review, just give me a call at 770-562-9629 or e-mail, giving me the date and location of your performance, and I'll handle the rest.




STARTLING AND ENCOURAGING FACTS FOR THE INDIVIDUALS WHO THINK THEY DON'T HAVE THE VOICE GOOD ENOUGH TO SING AS A QUARTET

t is a proven fact that humidity causes a loosening of the vocal chords which in turn

stimulates the urge to sing. This perhaps then explains the wide spread practice of shower stall singing.

Now it is my contention that this fact can be of great use in aiding a budding quartet to gain confidence by utilizing this phenomena to improve blend, resonance and tonal quality.



of the humidity needed. Steam cabinets are too re-

mote for "close harmony" and even with the jumbo type (accommodates four) it fails miserably in rehearsing stage presence. Certainly, minor problems arise, such as fogged-up glasses and soggy arrangements but this can be endured and mastered with a little ingenuity. "So far so good," you say, "This is great for practice but how about making public appearances?" (A natural question).

At first, this did pose a problem but I found that a portable shower solved the problem nicely. Of course,

Click on the members only link at the top of the page and you will find how hard at work our technology guru in Kenosha, **Scott Hogue**, has been. He is trying to automate as many tasks as possible and is making the lives of district and chapter secretaries much easier.

One of the great advantages is that you now can update your personal membership information, such as change of addresses, change of phone numbers or email addresses, etc., online, and the change takes effect immediately. Chapter secretaries can update information relating to chapter members too and are able to file their annual "New Officer Report" online. As your District Secretary, I find it most helpful in accessing information about chapters and district members.

SOCIETY DUES INCREASE

Some of you will notice the increase in Society dues that became effective with the December 31 renewals. Some time ago the Society Board took the necessary, though unpleasant, action of adopting a plan for incremental dues increases over several

years. So, when your renewal notice arrives this year, be aware of the increase and don't write the check for the same amount as last year.

SHOW CLEARANCE AND SHOW TAX

Just a friendly reminder that chap-

ters must secure a show clearance (ASCAP/BMI license) prior to any show for which admission is charged. Chapter Secretaries should have the appropriate form for requesting a show clearance and should hava a chart for calculating the proper amount of the license fee.

Once a show has been held, Dixie District's Code of Regulations requires that chapters pay a 4% show tax on the gross revenues of the show. Gross revenue includes all income received from the show, including the sale of ads, patron or friend listings, as well as ticket sales. The form for paying the show tax will be forwarded by me to chapter secretaries at the time the show clearance form is acknowledged.

The District has been fortunate to have many thorough and hard working secretaries. I am grateful to **Al Carter** for his excellent record-keeping and advice.

the normal dimensions are rather cramped so a little extra width gives the quartet better maneuverability. Instead of the traditional entrance, the quartet will be allowed to rub up a good lather behind drawn plastic curtains. (Wash clothes: optional). When each member is in voice and the proper pitch is blown then, with a quick rinse (four separate sprays are recommended for speed), the curtains are parted and a clean entrance is made. Costuming can vary from the traditional seaside attire to the most formal, what with the dripdry miracle fabrics of today. This unique idea could even be adapted to full chorus scale with a few changes and enlargement of the shower stall shell. For better audience participation during your show "intermission sings" try utilizing the auditorium sprinkler system. The effect is terrific and the crowd will be amazed.

Detailed plans for you "do-it-yourself" chapters fortunate enough to have a plumber as a member will be sent on request.

ORIENTATION THE FIRST STEP TO MEMBERSHIP RETENTION

EDITOR'S NOTE: Although, not a cure-all for membership retention, this plan shows how a well executed plan can be used to turn a visitor into an integral part of the chorus and make him feel like a "member".

ow many times have we taken a guest, given him a "guest book" and set him on the risers? How many times has he come back? Orientation - individual attention and training - is a good alternative to the "sink or swim" approach.

Every chapter plays a major role in the SPEBSQSA mission, to be an "ever-growing" society. Growth not only means an increase in the number of members, but also the development of personal skills and improved vocal technique. To this end, the chapter membership team should develop a New Member Orientation Plan to attract applicants and develop their skills to become valued chapter and performing chorus members.

The Plan begins with following up on contacts made for the open house and guest night. Preparatory activities are the public musical performances that have attracted potential applicants, an information booth staffed with greeters who fill out contact cards and extend invitations to attend an open house and guest night. Additionally, chapter members invite personal contacts to the guest night.

In the RTP Chapter, guest night is week one of four weeks of orientation and training of a class of three to eight new member applicants. The culmination of the plan is the successful audition and acceptance for membership of the applicant(s). To achieve this goal, men are given vocal training, orientation to the Society and the Chapter, and rehearsals to practice technique while learning three classic "polecat" barbershop arrangements, and a performance to demonstrate their readiness to the chapter on the next scheduled guest night.

Chapter resources are required to train the applicants. Each week, the Chapter Membership V.P. (or his designee) administers the orientation



session. Assisting him weekly is a member of the Music and Performance team. This person plays a key role and performs the initial voice placement, provides the vocal training, and conducts the polecat rehearsals. His job is to make sure the men are musically ready to audition and become members of the chapter.

The orientation to chapter activities is the responsibility of key chapter officers. They participate as required. In week one, the Chapter President or his designee conducts an introduction to barbershopping, a ten minute overview of the Society, the chapter and How to Become a Member.

In week two, the Music and Per-

formance V.P. provides a ten minute overview of rehearsals, contests and shows. In week three, the Executive V.P. (or Chapter Secretary), provides a ten minute orientation in chapter responsibilities, including dues and fees, chapter jobs and membership recruiting. The training materials required in the plan include the Member Handbook, a polecat learning tape (part specific), a warm-up tape, and the "I'm a Barberpole Cat" song sheet and membership badges, cards and certificates.

Warm-up tapes are provided at the nominal prevailing charge and become the property of the applicant. The handbook, learning tape and songsheet are provided at no charge at the first meeting (week 1) and collected at the final meeting (week 4). For successful applicants, the Handbook is personalized with the new members name on a spine insert and represented to him at the next Open House (week 5). Also presented at this time are membership badges, cards and certificates.

Once the applicant has become a member, his musical development and preparation to become a performing chorus member are administered by the Music and Performance V.P. with assistance by the Membership V.P. in updating membership records. With the firm foundation in Society lore and vocal training that an effective orientation plan provides, you can look forward to a life-long and productive barbershop member.

WHAT DO WE NEED TO DO TO GO TO CONTEST/CONVENTION?

e are still finding a lot of confusion regarding the forms and procedures needed for going to a convention and singing in a contest.

Some of the confusion is caused because we have been using the term "*Registration*" to cover all forms involved in contest/conventions. Also, not everyone who attends the convention competes in the contest. If we can all start trying to use the terminology below, that should help to reduce the confusion.

Generally speaking

CONTEST ENTRY FORM

The "Official Contest Entry Form", Form CJ-20, is the form that allows a competitor (Chorus or Quartet) to participate in a contest.

- 1. Forms are sent out by the Dixie District V.P., Contest & Judging.
- 2. Forms must be returned to the Dixie District V.P., Contest & Judging.
- 3. There is NO FEE required for this process.

QUARTET REGISTRATION

To be eligible to compete, quartets must be registered with the Society office in Kenosha. For more details, contact Lani Dieter at 800-876-7464. A FEE is required.

CONVENTION REGISTRATION

This is the process, usually submitted on a Convention Registration form, that allows a member or guest to attend the convention, whether or not they compete.

- 1. Forms may be mailed out, placed on the *Dixie District Web site*, or printed in the *Rebel Rouser*.
- 2. Forms must be returned to the address specified on the form.
- 3. There is a registration fee.

(Often a member of the chapter leadership will collect info from individual members, and submit the convention registrations as a group.)

HOUSING

This is the process to arrange for lodging at the convention city.


- 1. Forms may be mailed out, placed on the *Dixie District Web site*, or printed in the *Rebel Rouser*.
- 2. Deposit or credit card guarantee is generally needed.

(Often a member of the chapter leadership will collect information from individual members, and submit the housing requests as a group.)
