

This last note is for ALL of our Dixie membership. There is an ongoing effort to reach out to your chapter



(a) "Low Down Sound" the 2000

- (b) The Greater Knoxville Chapter has scored again, putting on a COED Festival last Jan 20th for over 200 young people from 27 High Schools in the Greater Knoxville metropolitan area...now that's a program!!!!!
- (c) RTP Chapter's 5th Annual HS Quartet Contest took place on 2/9/01. The male winners and their teacher will be attending the *Clemson Harmony Camp* in July. The female winners and their teacher will attend the SAI Summer Camp in Hickory, NC, also being held in July.
- (d) The 2001 CBQC prelims were held in Greenville, SC on March 17th and "Low Down Sound" repeated their winning ways. In July 2001 they will again represent the Dixie District at the International Convention CBQC.
- (e) Winston-Salem, NC Chapter in cooperation with the Piedmont Chamber Singers and the SAI Golden Triad Chorus staged their annual *a cappella Festival* on March 24th.
- **(f) Pride of Mobile Chorus** will put on another HS Quartet contest on 4/03/01.
- (g) The Huntsville, AL Chapter will feature a High School ensemble of about 15 or so young men on their upcoming annual show; these young

There is another incentive. This is a very special place in


HERE'S WHAT'S HAPP'NIN'




