

Dr. Robert A. Keppel, passed away July 24, 2006 in Hickory.

He attended Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, graduating in 1953 with a M.D. degree. Bob was a charter member of the Carolina Moonlighters barbershop chorus in Hickory. He had sung in various barbershop quartets since 1961, including The Old and Reckless.



Roger Payne passed away peacefully at Calvary Hospital. Roger slipped into unconsciousness, and never regained consciousness. When he passed, Rog was surrounded by his wife Nancy, son Kyle, brother Brian (and his wife), and, appropriately, the other members of Reveille, his beloved quartet.

Each of us has special memories of Roger who was a Founding Member and guiding light behind the BAC. His Barbershop accomplishments include singing in two Mid Atlantic District Championship quartets, the legendary 4 Under Par, and Reveille, as well as the highly entertaining Variety Pak. He served as Associate Director of the Big Apple Chorus, and Director of Brooklyn Chapter's Amazing Kings Chorus. He was a Certified Music Judge, and served as the Society's Music Category Specialist where he helped to re-write and re-define the Music category. Roger served as the Director and Coach of the HI Women of Note Chorus in Massachusets. There is so much more that I am sure I am forgetting in this very sad moment. But always, in whatever he did, Roger's brilliance, wit, and superb musicianship were on immediate display. Less obvious to those who didn't know him, was his great humanity and love for all his fellow Barbershoppers. Rog would sing with anyone who asked, as evidenced by the number of Novice quartets that Rog was part of in competition at the Division level. He embodied the term "encouragement" that appears in SPEBSQSA's formal title. May he rest in peace, and in eternal harmony. We extend our most sincere condolances to Nancy, Kyle, Rory, and the Payne family.

Your Board of Directors has been reviewing our DIX financial picture with income down due to decreases in attendance at our conventions and DLHW, or due to expenses rising because of increased transportation and general cost escalation. We reported to the recent House of Delegates meeting that we have established 6 separate task force committees to analyze major areas

where we can generate additional income or reduce expenses. Each task force will recommend changes for each major DIX budget line item where we provide services that generate income or incur expenses. Most of these studies will be completed by the end of this year and we will provide a complete report and budget adjustment at the next HOD meeting in March 2007.

One of those task forces has been looking at how we produce the Rebel Rouser which costs about \$2,600 per each quarterly issue and one of their recommendations is that we can generate a sizeable savings by producing and distributing the Rebel Rouser on our DIX web site. During the HOD meeting, we presented a cost analysis that was approved by the delegates for the next issue due out in November. In summary, this is what we proposed:

We will print and mail approximately 300 hard copies in black and white only (the issue will appear in full color on the website). DIX members who do not have an email address posted on their member record at Society HQ will receive a hard copy in the mail.

By printing only 300 or so copies of the Rebel Rouser in B & W (covers the 268 District members without

Internet access plus a few Society VIPs), we will save approximately \$725.00 in printing charges per issue.

At \$.27 each, we will save approximately \$500 in postage, bringing the total savings to \$1225 per issue.

We will send an email to DIX-Dist-Members@yahoogroups.com notifying everyone that a new issue is posted on the web site.

If your current email addresses with the Society or with the district yahoo accounts are not correct, we recommend that you update them so that we can maintain effective and timely communication with you.

If any member has an email address but does not belong to the DIX-Dist-Members@yahoogroups.com group account, please contact Don Lang at donl555@yahoo.com and he can provide instructions on how to become a member of the group.

Since the HOD also approved a 2007 Budget which included Internet delivery for the RR, we will continue to deliver electronically until the financial picture improves or we decide to go back to hard copies only.

Please make sure that all of your fellow chapter members are aware of this change and that each quarterly notification gets full chapter distribution.

We sincerely apologize for not getting the on-line credit card process up and running on the new web site for the Fall Convention in Chattanooga. We encountered some problems that we could not overcome in time to make it available for the convention registration and you to use.

Why did we not use the service we had been using? We discovered during our new web design last spring that the service we were using did not provide the security that we felt we needed to adequately protect your individual credit card numbers and the BOD felt we needed to make a change to a more secure process and company. That was also coupled with the fact

Thanks for your understanding . . . that our previous process required significant manual effort on the part of our registration team and all of the major credit card processors provide immediate posting

into our bank account after your card is approved.

We selected the company and process that the Society uses and started our enrollment process the week after Indianapolis with the assurance from the company representatives that it only took 10 days to get enrolled and they would then send us the information needed to design our links to their process. To make a long story short, by September 1st we still had not completed the process and they were requesting yet another form and signature from us and we still did not have anything from them to begin our

web design links and screens. Since it very unlikely that we could have anything designed, tested, and running until a week or so before the cutoff date for closing down registrations, we decided to terminate our effort and go with another service.

Thanks for your understanding and I assure you that we will have a new credit card process in place by next spring!

Registration will be 8:00-9:00 AM and the first session beginning at 9:00 AM.

Our COTS offering all tracks will be on 12-13 January 2007 (note this is Friday and Saturday) at the Catholic Church of St. Ann, 4905 Roswell Road, Marietta, GA 30062-6518. The first session will begin Friday evening at 8:30 PM. An additional note is TOP GUN will be at the same location and we hope to have a TOP GUN show at 8:00 PM on Saturday evening.

Is Harmony Foundation Part of Your Member Orientation?

Most chapters have an engrained cycle of recruiting new members, renewing members, and orientation sessions to explain the Society, the district, the chapter, our programs and activities, right?

And, of course, there is a presentation about Harmony Foundation?? NO?? Well, try these few paragraphs:

Harmony Foundation was founded in 1959 as a charitable subsidiary of the Barbershop Harmony Society. Its mission of "preserving the musical legacy of the Society through support of vocal music education in our schools ands communities" is summed up in a single slogan – SING for life!

The philosophy practiced is that Harmony Foundation, the District and Chapters are all on the same team to generate funds to further the barbershop harmony art form.

The Foundation (now numbering three staff people) possesses the fund raising expertise that is a resource to all levels of the Society. Their responsibility is to develop a volunteer cadre of Barbershoppers trained in assisting district and chapters in raising more money for self-support.

The Foundation currently offers many ways to invest, but here is a "quartet" of the most popular:

Ambassadors of Song – a monthly sponsor program where any level gift can be deducted from your bank account or charged to a credit card to provide funds over time.

Presidents Council – an annual giving program beginning at \$1000 per year can also be paid monthly on a credit card. Benefits include preferred seating and gala celebration at International and MidWinter conventions, plus free summer contest recording.

Donor Choice – in either of the programs just mentioned, you can designate up to 30% of your gift BACK to your district or chapter or 15% to each, What a great way to assist in underwriting a program of your choice!

Founders Club – the initial program started in the mid-1980s to create an endowment. Those involved either provided an outright gift (minimum \$1000) or a planned gift (e.g. bequest, life insurance, charitable trust, beneficiary in a will, etc.) You can always make Harmony Foundation part of your estate planning.

And as a chapter, we support Harmony Foundation as well as constantly seeking sources of community-minded, performing arts and music supporters to help us through grants and scholarships.

How easy is that? You could even photocopy this article and use it as a handout for the orientation session! Thanks for making your chapter members aware of this important funding source for the hobby they adore.

Prime location

Centering the Society in Music City will help increase awareness of the organization and the barbershop harmony art form.

Located in the immediate area of the new Society headquarters are the Nashville Convention Center, the Gaylord Entertainment Center, an arts magnet high school, a Masonic temple and a planned residential building. Only minutes away are the brand new Schermerhorn Symphony Center, Frist Center for the Visual Arts, Ryman Auditorium and Tennessee State, Belmont and Vanderbilt universities. Nashville, itself, is a prime tourism location.

Nashville awaits with open arms

The news of the Societys purchase brought positive reaction from Turner, executive director of the Nashville Downtown Partnership. "It's a good thing for downtown. When you take an existing structure and reactivate it, you're going to see a lot of good things happen." Turner ought to know, he's been a driving force behind the redevelopment of downtown Portland, downtown St. Louis, and now, Nashville.

Purchase and renovation of the building will be funded by money from the 2003 sale of Society's properties in Kenosha and financing arranged through Sun Trust Bank. Purchase price was \$1,450,000. The anticipated move date is late summer 2007.
