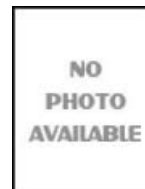

**O**n November 17, 2007 two successful Dixie District Regional One-day Chapter Operations Training Seminars (COTS) were held. Seventy 2008 officers were trained. The Northeast Regional COTS was held at Richmond Community College in Hamlet, NC, and the Southwest Regional COTS was held at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Our objectives in having regional one-day COTS are to train more chapter officers by making training more accessible both monetarily and time wise

thus reducing cost to your chapter.

If more of your officers are trained for their jobs, your chapter's administration should operate much more smoothly and the leadership will better know how to coordinate the operations.

We also must thank our superb faculty at both locations (all of whom hail from Dixie) for being well prepared and teaching in the most exemplarily manner.

At Birmingham, class 1 was strictly single track.

After lunch there were combined sessions of Presidents, Secretaries, and Treasurers meeting in one group and Chapter Development Membership and Marketing & PR in another.

The faculty merged their instruction exceptionally well. The final two hours was a general session with Drew Ellis demonstrating the new Ebiz section of the BHS website and commenting about membership plans for 2008 and beyond. Then Noah Funderburg led a mock chapter planning meeting to demonstrate how a

chapter might elect to go about planning and stress the importance of continuous planning in the chapter.

At Hamlet, classes 1 and 2 were track specific, while class 3 was a joint class with everyone participating.

Class 3 consisted of Dennis Evans presenting a Chapter Planning class that gets all chapter members to buy into chapter goals for the year, Chuck Greene's briefing, "Compellingly Attractive Chapter Meetings", a look at revitalizing chapters, (this was requested by the attendees), and a ten minute update of the Carolina District Initiative by two members of the Carolina Task Force who were

Post-COTS evaluations overwhelmingly support the continuation of one-day regional COTS. Increased attendance at the regional one-day COTS is another indication of support. There will be one more Regional COTS in Atlanta on 12 January, 2008 for 2008 officers. If you had a conflict with the 17 November, 2007 date, you still have an opportunity to participate in getting training and sharing your experiences and successes with other chapters and barbershoppers. 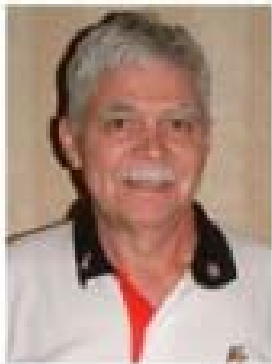

# 2008 Brings Many YIH Opportunities

**Y**our Dixie District Board of Directors recently approved a Youth In Harmony 2008 budget that allows financial assistance in several areas. The new budget includes scholarships for two music educators to Harmony University, financial assistance for up to two College Quartet competitors in

Nashville, financial supplements for two one-day festivals, help with expenses for a competitor in the San Antonio youth chorus contest, and assistance in funding exhibits at two music educator conventions.

In addition to all of that financial assistance, Harmony Foundation now supplements the costs of one-day high school festivals to the tune of \$10 per student and educator attending. They continue to supplement the costs of Harmony Explosion Camps at a rate of \$50 per student and Educator.

This is great news for our efforts to create a second District Harmony Explosion Camp for the Chapters, students and teachers who live in the western parts of the District, and who simply are too far away from the Clemson Camp to attend. Plans are for the west HX Camp to be held on July 11 through the 13th in the Birmingham area. This will be a two-day camp (all day Friday and Saturday, with a Saturday night show) whereas the Clemson camp, held the following week, is a three-day event.

The clinician for the west camp will be James

Estes, the Music Specialist from the Society. The teaching quartet will be selected later. James's resume is available at the following website:

I must have evidence from the Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee and Georgia Chapters that they will support this camp both with finding interested campers and teachers, and with sponsorships, before this will become a reality. If you want this camp to happen, let me know of your support.

The clinicians for the Clemson HX Camp are Dr. Bill Adams, who many of you saw work his magic at last year's camp, and Michael Martin, Director of Choral Activities/Music Education at Methodist University in Fayetteville, NC. The teaching quartet will be **Lunch Break**, the hilarious new 2007 Dixie District Quartet Champions.

In my last article, I proudly said that two Music Educators from Dixie had been sent to



the 2007 Harmony University on scholarship. It turns out that I was wrong. Actually, there were three. Braeden Kershner from Southern Wesleyan

University attended on a Society scholarship. Braeden is a music educator in the Charleston area and is now a member of the Charleston Chapter. He was selected to direct one of the Harmony University choruses while at HU. This is a great way to make teachers aware of the benefits of introducing barbershop into their music programs.

# Get Involved, Grow, Have More Fun!

I recently attended the District Presidents Forum and Society Board meetings at our new Society Headquarters in Nashville, and I must say it was a very worthwhile trip to the Music City.

Our Society is in the process of replacing its management philosophy with a new approach that uses simpler, more focused goals and aims. Some of you may have noted the new Society AIMS just released. One of these new AIMS is that Chapters become more involved in serving their communities. As a marketer, you've got to admit that's a PR gold mine!

There are so many choices you may literally have to get the Chapter Board together for a special meeting to discuss all the options. I hope your Chapter already donates a portion of your income to a well-known and worthy local charity. When you do that, it opens many doors to promote your Chapter's activities, and it helps the Chapter build partnerships with media and other local groups, thus expanding your base of support.

People are more likely to buy a ticket to the Barbershop Show if they know they are helping the local charity hospital, Shriners, MDA, shelter, food bank, etc. Local TV stations, radio stations and newspapers are also much more likely to help you promote the show if such a charitable aspect is part of your plan. Make it a prominent part of your marketing push for the show!

Imagine the community support you could build if you started now promoting a Veteran's Day salute show for 2008, with plans to donate a portion of the proceeds to a local Veterans organization! Let's salute our town's #1 Military family...or #1 Military Mom. Let's reunite a returning soldier with his family at the show! Let's get some more ideas cranking! How cool could this be? How much publicity would it generate for

our Chapter? How many tickets could we sell? How many new members could we recruit? Stand back!

Whatever cause your Chapter chooses to embrace, get representatives from the charity to go with you when you make public appearances that benefit

them. Let them speak for a brief moment after or before you sing. Bring a rep with you to that radio station morning show quartet shot or TV interview. This adds tons of credibility and sends the message that we are here and we are serious about being a positive force in our community.

Some Chapters have built long-term relationships with one particular local charity. Others help a variety of organizations. It all depends on what is the best fit for your particular Chapter.

In any case, the main thing is, Get Involved! Sing out and contribute to your community! The by-products are all desirable: your Chapter grows because of the extra exposure; your Members are stoked because the Chapter is active and everyone is getting plenty of chances to perform. Your community becomes more aware of your presence and perceives your Chapter as a valued and contributing entity.

Bob Davenport will take over the Marketing & PR Vice President's job for 2008 and beyond. He is a very capable and creative guy with tons of experience at this, having served on the Society's Marketing & PR committee. It has been my privilege to serve you in this capacity for the past 3 years, and now I'm moving to a new job in the Dixie District. # Last Call for Contest and Judging Applicants!

**T**his is the LAST CALL for all barbershoppers who are interested in becoming a judge to begin applying for the Contest and Judging program. You still have until December 31, 2007, but I would suggest that you begin preparing your applications NOW.

Currently we have NINE certified judges (3-Contest Administrators and 6-Singing Judges) in Dixie, but with the Society office moving to Dixie, we will have several more C&J members joining our ranks. I also have the applications of NINE Dixie barbershoppers who are interested in becoming members of the C&J family. We are always looking for more men who have a desire to study and prepare for the C&J program. It takes time, money, and commitment to make the "cut".

However, the rewards of camaraderie and service far outweigh the costs of preparation.

You should now have lined up TWO certified judges in the category that you wish to enter (Contest Administrator, Music, Presentation, Singing) to recommend you via letter or email to your District Director of C&J (that's me!). You will also need to have FIVE other character

references to vouch for you as an applicant for the C&J program. Please consider Society members who know your abilities and who can comment on your suitability for the judging program.

Forms for both the CA and SCORING categories are found in the Contest and Judging Handbook in the Document section of the Society website. On the opening page of the Society webpage click on "Compete" and highlight C&J Forms. If needed, I will also send the forms attached to an email directly to you if you will contact me. You can also read and study all about these categories in the C&J Manual as well. I would strongly suggest that you do some studying and ask some questions of certified judges before deciding to enter the program. You

will need to download a copy of the C&J Handbook for your personal use during your training and for future reference.

Here is the time line we will be utilizing. The TWO letters or emails of recommendation can be sent immediately to me. You can also send the application forms containing the five other references that are required. Once I have reviewed your application and followed up with your references, I will notify you if your application has been approved by me and I will send my recommendation on to the Category Specialist in your chosen category for his consideration. You will be notified in early 2008 if you have been accepted as an Applicant in the program. From that point on you will be totally in the hands of your

Category Specialist for training. Your training will begin as you are prepared for Judge Candidate School which will be held in July, 2008 during the week prior to Harmony University at Southwest Missouri State University in St. Joseph, MO.

Once you have "passed" the requirements at Candidate School you will be promoted to a Candidate Judge in your category. You will then have another two years to prepare for invitation to the 2010 Category School where you will hopefully be certified for three years. During this two-year candidacy program, you will attend a minimum of THREE conventions a year as a GUEST panelist to ply your trade and learn from the certified panel you will be working with. You will also have some homework to complete during those two years, which will also help determine whether you receive an invitation to attend the Category School. It is not an automatic invitation anymore. You have to earn your wings before you can fly!

I didn't say it was easy. But I did say it is a VERY rewarding experience. You will meet and work with some of the most talented and congenial men in the Society. Many of the barbershoppers who are members in the C&J community are your heroes! You will be rewarded by the opportunity

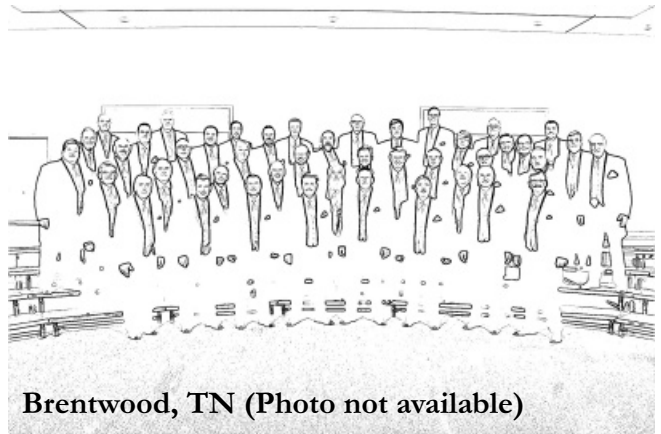

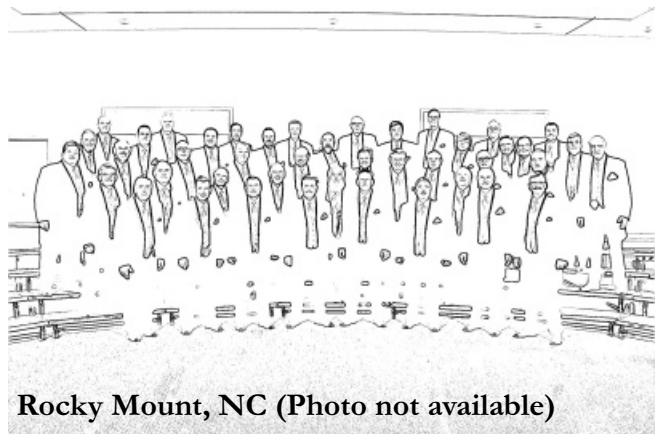
