

2. The annual DIX District Top Gun Invitational was one of the most successful in the history of the program. Congrats to Ralph Cordaro and Jack Donaldson for the outstanding planning and ordiestration. The Top Gun Invitational is a full week end coach ing work shop for our topdrawer DIX quartets in preparation for the upcoming International Quartet Competition and has a sustaining, outside grant to cover all costs. No district funds have been expended in the last two years for th is program.

3. We conducted three regional CO TS Schools (now term ed Leadership Academ ies) with in our DIX District. The die is cast regional Leadersh ip Academ ies are the wave of the future.

4. The annual Midwinter Convention in San Antonio was the finest I 've ever attended. The Youth Chorus Contestwas outstanding and the 2009 Midwinter Convention in Pasadena, CA promises to be even greater.

5. The DIX Board metin Norcross, GA on February 1/3, 2008 and confirm ed/sh ared their 2008 work plans. Al Carter was appointed as VP for Financial Developmentbutmoved to Florida in June (bummer). Much of our discussion revolved around producing a more finite recording of district income and expense by line and sub-line coding in order to better track results and take corrective measures where deemed necessary. Software was finally obtained (at a huge discount) and is now being program med to fit our needs. This will be of immense assistance in

ongoing financial tracking and measurement

6. The 2008 Spring Convention in Greenville, SC was one of the besteverheld in the District. I congratulate members from the Carolinas for their trem endous support and for making ita m ajor success.

7. I and three other members of the 2008 Board metwith Nate Pendley, Bob Anderson, Jack Cox and Randy Miller (of the Carolinas) on July 12 in Columbia, SC to address a number of concerns expressed by members and leaders of the Carolinas di apters. Itwas the first in a series of opportunities to find outwhat the "hotbuttons" are, and we will continue to seek such input on how we can improve District operations and assist chapters and members in enjoying this h obby. If you didn't you missed a super contest with (DIX) State Line Grocery in 3rd place medals, (DIX) Redline in forth place, (DIX one member of) Storm Frontin 6th place, (DIX one member of) Glory Days in 7th place, (DIX) Lunch Break in 13th place, (DIX) Great Nash ville Singoutin 37th place and (DIX) Pinstripe in 39th place. All of these competitors were outstanding. (DIX) Atlanta Vocal Project performed their way to 7th place and is knocking on the door of the "top five." If th at wasn't enough, the Memphis, TN Chapter was justash ortstone's throw away from being selected as a "wild card chorus competitor" and became mic testers. It looks like 2009 could be the year that the DIX District has two dioruses (or m ore) going to the Society International Convention in Analeim, CA. Bring it on!

9. Butwith all we have to be truly thank ful for, there is an urgent need to provide even better service to our DIX Chapters/members and create chapter extension sites. Much of that is in the mixer and I hope to be able to share it with you in the near future.

10. On the heels of the Society Convention, our annual Dixie Lakeside H arm ony Weekend (Clem son, SC) occurred on July 17/20, 2008. A thendance was a bitstagnant (approx. 120), probably because m any DIX barbersh oppers h ad to make a choice between the International and DLH W. Butitwas a terrific weekend of craft, quartet coach ing, and worksh ops thatstill dazzle m y m ind. In addition, we sold \$6,000 of tickets to the local community, thanks, in part, to the members of the Seneca and Spartanburg, SC Chapters, tons of PSA radio advertisements, the DIX website, and posters hung in just about every church in the area. And what a show it was! Next year, we'll do even better. 11. I didn'tm ention the H arm ony Explosion Camp (above) but it was truly exceptional, as we seem to reach a new milestone each and every July. Congratulations to Jm and Barbara Moore and all the giving and talented folks who break their backs to make this an annual success. Did I mention? The H X Camp Ch orus wowed our Saturday night audience, again, and again, and again!

12. The DIX Board convened again on August 8/10, 2008 at Red Top Mountain Georgia State Park justoutside of Cartersville, GA to conduct ongoing District business. We had a very length y agenda including, but not limited to the following actions:

As I finally lay in myhotel bed that Friday night in Greenville... or was it Chattanooga... or K noxville...(?), k now ing that, for the first time, I would sing again on Saturday night, I though tho myself, "You know, maybe this whole barbershop quartet thing isn't so bad after all." Back in those days, I was a fresh young kid who didn't need much encouragement And I was in for life! Thats all part of the magic of whath appens when we blend our voices in perfectly-balanced, flaw lessly-tuned barbersh op h arm ony.

Another thing I've noticed is that when I am singing, my back never hurts, my feet are never sore, and I am notworried at all about global clim ate change, the price of gas, or that drip in the kitch en sink. Suddenly one day, I looked around and found that I had been singing and rehearsing and perform ing and traveling and eating and sleeping with Loose Change for 15 years! How did that happen? Seems like only last convention we broke into the Top Ten for the very first time. We've been together through 15 years of h ope and h ard work, the loss of loved ones, dranging job situations, the joy of perform ing, health complications, marriages, family situations and court costs. And I know I speak for atleast three out of the four of us when I say that I wouldn't trade am inute of it for a District d am pionship. The relationships you build with the guys you sing with can be some of the most treasured relationships of your life. Like the Dixie District, Loose Change has 60 years among us. They've been 60 of the bestyears of my life.

This 60th Anniversary convention will be complete with commemorative banners, special merch and ise in the Dixie Marketplace and perform ances by past of am pions. We'll have birth day cake. Backs will be slapped and stories will be told of the good old days. And maybe, just maybe, once again, some fresh - faced, silkenvoiced youngster with nothing in his heartbuth ope and love for the music will make his very first cut.



Marketing Dixie in 2008

ntroduction: This report will contain a brief sum m ary of 2008 Marketing/PR activities and how we can improve in these areas.

1. 2008 Spring Convention in Greenville, SC – As we all know, this was one of the best-attended conventions in recentmemory. Notonly did more District barbersh oppers attend the convention, but our marketing/public relations efforts paid off in persuading about 240 people from the general public to purch as single-session contest tickets. To myknow ledge, this is the largest num ber of tick ets we have sold to the public for one of our District conventions! As a result, the District grossed about \$3,600 from these ticket sales

Mike Schierm ann once again produced an excellent radio advertisement that was aired on the strongest radio station in the Greenville/Spartanburg area. Also, I produced a press release which Jm Fannin (Spartanburg VPof Marketing/PR) helped me distribute to local media (print, radio, TV) outlets. Jm developed a list of local media outlets and personnel for us to contact. This listwas invaluable! Furtherm ore, Public Relations our efforts paid off in persuading a local TV station to do an

interview with myself, Thom H ine, Dr. Don Campbell (Spartanburg di orus director), and Lund Break which aired on Friday night of the convention. We had to cancel a possible quartet appearance on a radio station because of scheduling conflicts, buth opefully we can do that in the future.

As I discussed at January's BO D meeting, building this kind of relationship with the Marketing VPof the local drapter hosting a convention will help build greater communication and relationships between myself and these diapter VPs. I plan to continue this practice in the fall and with future conventions. O verall, I was extremely pleased with the marketing effort for the Spring Convention.

II. Dixie Lakeside H arm ony Weekend – As

Ralph Cordaro noted in h is post-DLH W report, we had an attendance of over 600 people for the DLH W show, enabling us to gross alm ost \$6,000 from the show. Thom and Jm Moore distributed tick ets and flyers to businesses, radio stations, etc. in the Clemson area. John Witmerwith the Spartanburg diapter and Dean Manning lielped trem endously with tick etsales for the show. Also, we furnished tables on the night of the show for the Spartanburg and Seneca diapters to distribute promotional materials to show patrons who expressed an interest in learning about them and aboutbarbersh op in general.

III. District communication channels – I have a greatworking relationship with Rebel Rouser editor Keith Therrell and with District Webmaster Mark H yde. Both gentlemenhave been extremely accomm odating in helping me dissem inate inform ation, etc. to our District membership concerning our marketing efforts and goals. We have also added a few new diapter Marketing VPsChapter-Mktg-PR@yahoogroups.com) so that I can communicate with as many of them as possible. There is also a page on the District website explaining the services that I provide as District Marketing/PR VP. Additionally, one or two diapter VPs have readied out to the group for ideas and inform ation in helping them accomplish their tasks, which is one of the visions I had for this yah oogroup.

IV. Dixie DistrictMarketplace – We continue to monitor the success and viability of the Marketplace and to find ways to improve its operation and profitability. A Mark etplace m anual is being developed to reflect these improvements and ensure the efficiency of its operation for future Marketplace managers. We completed a 2007 Mark etplace inventory, but Steve D'Ambrosio also recently told me that H orace Bennetth ad found som e boxes of inventory in h is garage, so we will probably have to revise th ose figures.

According to Steve's records, we sold \$295.25 worth of merch and ise at the Greenville convention. At the recent DLH W, I operated the (see Mark e ting on page 9)

2008-2009 Leadership Academy Time

næm ore we are approach ing the time of the year when drapter nom inating committees are finalizing and announcing the 2009 slate of officers they have worked on since January. As required by paragraph 4.1.1.1, Chapter Election Schedule/Procedure of the Society Operations Manual: "A slate of proposed officer candidates should be placed before the chapter in Septem ber so that elections can take place in late Septem ber through O ctober. This permits chapter secretaries to notify their district directory agencies and the



By Dave Millson Chapter Support & Leadership Training Society regarding the new officers in sufficient time to allow for timely publication of appropriate directories for the following year. Completing elections in Septem ber provides more time for successful candidates to make plans to attend CO TS" Chapter elections need to take place by O ctober 15th and the reporting of new officers needs to be accomplished as soon as possible after that.

Chapter secretaries or substitute secretaries should update the g new ly elected officers im mediately after election on the "Officer" web page of the Society ebiz web pages (www.eBiz.barbersh op.org). This is the only place you will report the 2009 officers. Secretaries should make new entries for repeating officers using the dates of 1 January, 2009 and 31 December, 2009 respectively. Both the Society and District gets all inform ation about chapter officers from ebiz.

All officers should attend a Leadersh ip Academ y. The nom inating committee should have emphasized this requirement as a prerequisite to become a candidate for office. On apters should budget for registration and travel expenses for officer's attendance to a Leadersh ip Academ y.

Last year we had three regional Leadership Academ ies (COTS). We will again have three regional Leadership Academ ies for the 2008-2009 training cycle. On 22 Novem ber, 2008 the locations are the University of Alabam a,

Mark etplace in Steve's absence. Because of the limited supply of available merch and ise, etc., we only sold \$198 in merch and ise.

Ourt Douglass has donated a laptop computer to the District to be used for the Marketplace so that Steve does not have to transport the desk top computer to and from each convention. This and the software program loaded onto that computer will help Steve with the operation and record keeping.

I delivered a separate presentation at the BOD meeting about de veloping an "online store" for the District butdue to pastm anagem entproblem s and the fact that much of our merch and ise in stock is faded and notsaleable at the prices marked, I strongly recommend that we have a "fire sale" of these items at the Fall Convention in Chattanooga and begin the process of creating an online store as a few Districts and several Society diapters (including $A \lor P$) have already done. We can still have a few items to sell at Districtevents (CDs, etc.), but the majority of it would be sold online. I firm ly believe that this concept, if properly implemented and m anaged, will m ean even greater revenue for the District and greater efficiency of operation for the Mark e to lace.

Conclusion: I believe that we have achieved some of the goals I set for this year, but we have also only begun to "scratch the surface" of accomplishing other goals in helping market Districtevents and in helping chapter Marketing VPs market their chapters more effectively. I look forward to working toward those goals in 2009.



Small Chorus Shows

One of the diaracteristics of the many diapters with in the Society is a large number of small diapters in relatively small markets. Small diapters share several diaracteristics among which are:

• Sm all m arketareas for both "product" and m em bersh ip options.

• Fund raising issues due to limited options, problems with getting all four voice parts together for a gig, resources for staging major events like shows.

• Providing a quality product. Sm all ch oruses often h ave no or only one quartet and limited singing skills am ong mem bers.

The "problems" present opportunities. One example has been the cooperation between the Carolina Moonligh ters located in H ick ory, NC and the Gaston Ch ord Weavers located in Gastonia, NC. Between the two chapters are the collective problems of size, limited markets, limited resources, age demographics, quality of product due to chorus size, voice part logistics from time to time, exposure opportunities and the related ability to generate revenue to continue existing operations and grow. The chapters have recognized these issues and, in O ctober, will present their third jointshow.

The first two shows, one a "regular" annual show and the other a Christmas show done with a local Sweet Adeline drorus (Carolina Style from New ton-Conover), were high ly successful and have led to continuing cooperation. While those shows presented quality shows to both communities, there is always room for



im provement – especially when the choruses only rehearse together in preparation for shows.

While both choruses have excellent and dedicated

directors, it is always helpful to get a "second opinion" (in this case, third opinion) to help with singing skills and presentation. Continuous improvement requires looking at different ways to explain things and coaching. So, the two choruses agreed to present the bestshow possible given all the "disadvantages" of small choruses and utilize District resources to accomplish that goal.

The choruses arranged to have Thom H ine come to Gastonia to help us be the bestwe can be. And what a job Thom did! By the end of a 6 h our coaching session the combined chorus sounded better than the sum of its parts. Itsounded like a chorus that had rehearsed frequently as one and made major strides in producing a product far better than the good product that resulted from the first two shows. If the old adage "the third time is a charm" is true, then Thom's efforts with the Moonligh ters and Chord Weavers will result in the best joint show yet.

There are a couple of m orals to the story, so far.

• Sm all diapters can benefit from joint efforts and might want to create their own joint coadi ing opportunities. Call your neighbor and set one up.

• Regard less of diapter size, take ad van tage of the resources available to improve the quality of your diapter's product.

As a post script, m any of the Moonligh ters h ad not been through an intense coaching experience – several eyes were opened and the benefits carried over to the first post coaching rehearsal and a sm all gig a week later. The embarrassing part, of course, is that m any of the things Thom helped us with were really validations of what our directors h ad already told us. Drat the luck... ... Anyhow, kudos to Thom form aking the trip from Atlanta to help our choruses im prove. We deeply appreciate h is know ledge, coaching abilities and dedication to helping chapters do their best.



New Society Plan & Dues Policy for Youth

Effective January 1, 2009, the Society studentmembership dues category will be eliminated, and a new Society youth membership dues category will be established with the following qualifications and dues:

(i) New youth members must be under 26 years of age at the date of enrollment

(ii) Society dues for new youth members are waived for the first year of membership (but subject to a \$10.00 enrollment fee); and

(iii) Renew al dues for all youth members (under age 26 at the effective date of renew al) are set at the rate of 50% of the dues for the Society's regular membership dues category.

The DIX District Board will propose a district "overlaying" dues policy during the O ctober 3, 2008 Fall H ouse of Delegates meeting in Ch attanooga, TN. I strongly encourage all DIX Ch apter H ouse of Delegates Representatives to be in attendance and vote "for" the motion.
