



What's NEW for 2010 COTS / Leadership Academy Schools

For example, we will be having a singing session, with each class sending forth their class as a VLQ or Chorus to sing one song. The faculty will judge the event an award a winner. Secondly, everyone attending one of the 4 schools will receive a tag booklet with mucho tags in them. Yeah, and we'll sing some of these too. Get the idea? We're going to learn the classroom material and we're going to SING and sing bunches.

Now, what do you as chapters want to see done at COTS? I mean I want your input. It is your school and although we HAVE to present certain elements regarding each office, there's no reason we can't add some SINGING too. So, write me, call me, email me and tell me what YOU would like added to YOUR COTS schools for January 2010.

Youth In Harmony

The 2009 Birmingham Harmony Explosion Camp was held July 9–11 at the Indian Springs School, just south of Birmingham. Twenty-two students and six music educators participated. Clinicians Jim DeBusman and Dr. Al Miller, the director of vocal music at the University of Mobile, worked their magic with the students. The teaching quartet, RamTonz, was very effective and well liked by the campers. This is the first year for this camp to be a full three-day

camp where six songs were taught. With the help of the Central Alabama Chapter, Loose Change, and N2Deep, the Saturday night show for an audience of over 150 was wonderful.

The 2009 Clemson Harmony Explosion Camp on July 16-19 had 96 campers and 14 educators present. The

clinicians were Dr. Ben Ayling from Kent State University, and Dr. Jerry Ulrich from Georgia Tech. The teaching quartet was On Demand from the Sunshine District. Seventy four campers came from Georgia, twelve from North Carolina, six from Tennessee, three from South Carolina and one from Virginia. This year, the campers enjoyed a tag singing contest emceed by Jay Norton, videos of great barbershop contest performances, ultimate Frisbee, a pizza party, singing to the volleyball girls, and a wonderful Saturday night show in the Brooks Center, in which they performed their six songs. Their teachers performed as well.

These camps are this successful only because of the support of Harmony Foundation, and generous individuals, quartets, and chapters

within the District who help sponsor the campers and teachers. If you get the chance, please thank these donors who support Youth In Harmony: Familiar Ring Quartet, Loose Change Quartet, David Collins, Central Alabama Chapter, New River Harmony, Research Triangle Chapter, Savannah Chapter, Jim Nappier, Triad Harmony Express, Pete Pifer, Nashville Chapter, Freeman Groat, Atlanta Vocal Project, Jade Walker, and the Charlotte Chapter.

Here are a few excerpts from the comments of teachers who attended a camp: "As a choral director of 28 years, I thank you...for the wonderful experience you have provided for teachers...and especially for my students. What a wonderful way to encourage these young guys to keep on singing...It has been incredible - a shot in the arm for an 'old' teacher and a blast for the students." "Thank you so much for this amazing activity for both, my boys and myself. They have learned a lot and had a great time as well. This is the most benevolent act that has ever been done for my students, and I am overwhelmed at what a quality weekend this has been. You have a new fan in me - for life." "I want to thank you so much for bringing Harmony Explosion to the Birmingham area. I had four students attend last year and they came back with such a great enthusiasm for barbershop. They talked so much about it, I brought 8 this year. They come back with so much confidence in themselves and in their singing abilities."

Please help us to continue to provide these summer camp opportunities to young men singers. Ask your chapter administration to include funds in next year's budget for scholarships for future camps. If you need

The Nashville Chapter's International Journey

When we learned that our chorus had qualified as a wildcard to the International chorus contest, we were ecstatic! It had been 31 years since the Nashville chapter competed on the big stage, and while it was a thrill for our new members to qualify, it was doubly exciting for the six men who sang with Nashville in 1978 to earn a return trip.

In some ways, this journey began four years ago, when the chorus decided to rededicate itself to the kind of effort it would take to be a high quality chorus. As each member signed a covenant which expressed commitment to quality, fraternity, and fun, we knew that we were on our way.

This renewed commitment paid immediate dividends, as the chorus started growing in membership and began a steady rise in scores at contest.

Fall 2005 – 24 men scoring 66.3%

Fall 2006 – 39 men scoring 72.8%

Fall 2007 - 42 men scoring 75.4%

The final piece of the puzzle in reaching the level of International competitor was the addition of members of the Barbershop Harmony Society staff to our chapter. Not only have these men been wonderful performers, but they also have given generously of their time to serve in leadership capacities as well.

This new influx of talent, combined with the continued improvement of the core of the Music City Chorus, lead to a Fall 2008 contest score of 81.2% (with 49 men on the risers), and a wildcard bid to Anaheim.

After the fall contest, one of the first decisions the music team had to make was whether to keep our set for the International contest. Since our guys really bought into the message of "The Sushine of Your Smile," we decided to keep our ballad. However, we did decide to change uptunes. After several weeks of suggestions, we hit upon "Sugarcane Jubilee" as our new contest vehicle. In order to get this new and very challenging piece ready for spring contest, we asked the guys to come back from holiday break with the song learned. And in only two weeks' time our guys returned to the first rehearsal of the new year virtually off paper! Though we officially won the Spring contest in March, the reality is that we actually won it during those two weeks of committed and dedicated personal work by our guys on the risers.

Throughout our growth several coaches have been of immeasurable help to us. George Gipp inspired us to give passionate performances, Clay Hine gave us valuable advice on singing with proper resonance and connected phrases, and Kevin Keller taught us fundamental elements of musicality. And in the months leading up to International, two coaches in particular played a vital role in the development of our package.

Joe Connelly made several trips to Nashville to work with us on applying the basics of proper vocal production and balance and tuning to EVERY chord we sing. His ability to spot flaws was amazing, and helped us to refine our package.

Then, a month before Anaheim, Roger Stanfield (presentation guru from Great Northern Union), worked with us during our chorus retreat on setting the mood for our songs. He really helped us tap into deep emotional connections with the two pieces, working for a sincere and believable presentation. During our retreat, we also had some special times of sharing with each other, as each man in the chorus opened up and talked about the special moments they have had with their own personal "Sunshine" of their smile. It was a great moment of togetherness for the chorus. and helped our package reach new levels of emotion.

Once we got to Anaheim, we had two more official rehearsals before the Friday contest. During our second rehearsal, our ladies' auxiliary organization (The Entourage), gave each man on the risers a bundle of "fan mail." notes written to us by family and friends wishing us well. This capped off our preparation, and by the time the chorus hit the risers, we were ready! Several guys made the comment that because they felt so wellprepared they were not nervous at all. This was a great tribute to our musical leadership, and especially our director - Mike O'Neill, and our

associate director - Dusty Schleier. We also took time during our chorus dinner to acknowledge the men who had been with the chorus from the last International until this one, presenting them plaques with the inscription "A Bridge to the Future." It was truly a wonderful week for our chapter.

We certainly want to thank the Dixie District for its incredible support. It was a privilege to represent the greatest district in the Society on the International stage along with our brothers in Atlanta, and we hope we can do it again in Philly! Until then, thanks for cheering us on.

Notes From Anaheim Convention

WOW! Those of you that decided to not go to Anaheim missed the best convention and competition that I have personally experienced and I have been to every one of them beginning with the 1984 convention! Attendance was down with about 6200 in attendance. However, it was historic in many ways so let me just mention a few of them.

- For the first time ever, DIX had two choruses in the chorus contest. AVP finished 12th with their highest score ever at 87.4 and the Nashville Music City finished 18th with 82.8. Congratulations to all the CHB Generals and Colonels competing in these choruses that represented us well!
- Two quartets from SUN (Lucky Day and On Demand) had A-level 81+ scores in the quarter finals and did not make the semi-finals.
- For the first time ever, two affiliate quartets (Ringmasters from SNOBS and Musical Island Boys from NZABS) made both the semi-finals and the finals.
- For the first time ever, an affiliate quartet (Ringmasters) medaled, finishing in a tie for 4th place with our own Stateline Grocery.
- For the first time ever, nine of the top ten quartets finished with 90+ scores.
- A new award sponsored by the 1973 Champions, Dealer's Choice, was awarded to the highest ranked new quartet competing at INTL for the first time, Musical Island Boys.
- For the first time ever, an affiliate chorus (Zero 8 from SNOBS and Vocal FX from NZABS) made the top ten in the chorus contest.
- The 11 time gold medal chorus champions from Dallas, The Vocal Majority, scored their highest score ever averaging 96.3 in this judging system (implemented in 1993) in the Friday afternoon chorus session.
- The record only lasted a few hours as the St. Charles Ambassadors of Harmony scored 97.5 winning the gold medal for the second time and sending the VM to the silver medal for the first time since 1978.
- Dixie's Brandon Guyton earned his second quartet gold medal as the baritone of Crossroads.

All I can say is you really had to be there to fully appreciate the level of these performances!

Music Educator Notes Value of Harmony University

Mary Sellers, a Memphis high school music educator, attended on scholarship the recent Harmony University in St. Joseph, MO.

Ms. Sellers teaches at White Station High School in the Memphis City School system. This school year she has a total of 280 students in general vocal music classes, chamber choir, and show choir. For several years the Memphis chapter has been involved in bringing barbershop harmony to Ms. Sellers' classes. Harmony University however was her first opportunity to experience barbershop on such a large scale.

"As I sat there and listened to OC Times and the other terrific singers at Harmony University I had a list of students run through my head who I wished could have been there," said Ms. Sellers. "They would have loved it!"

Ms. Sellers's HU experience included course work in choral methods, the physics of sound, warm ups, and vocal pedagogy. "I benefited immensely from these classes and I especially enjoyed the opportunity that we music educators had to sit in on a variety of classes."

According to Ms. Sellers there is an important role that Barbershoppers can play in the classroom, especially in schools that have female vocal music teachers. "We (the female educators) are the ones who can't give that vocal example to our tenors and our basses. It's imperative for them to sing around other men. Additionally, sometimes these young men don't understand why they need to study music when they don't intend for it to be their career. Seeing grown men who are in engineering, or who are doctors, who work in construction, or who are involved in all different things – seeing them enjoying music later in life is a great example to these kids."

Barbershoppers know the enrichment that singing brings to our lives, so it should be no surprise that others in the music community also find value in our hobby. Ms. Sellers sees Barbershop singing and programs like Harmony University and Harmony

Explosion camps as effective methods in her overarching mission. "My job is to provide my students with all the opportunities they need to be successful in whatever they want to do in life.

These programs are excellent opportunities for my kids. I would really love in the near future to bring some of my students to Harmony University or to a Harmony Explosion Camp. Barbershop is an excellent opportunity for my students."

Registration for Harmony University 2010 will start in January. The HU dates are August 1-8, 2010.




Mary Sellers sporting a pair of "Hear Phones" at Harmony University.


