

2011 Mid Winter Society Board Meeting

The Society Board met on Thursday and Friday, January 27th and 28th at the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas. Both days the meeting was called to order and those present sang the American and Canadian national anthems. Immediate Past President Biffle read aloud the mission and vision statements of the society. The second day of the meeting, January 28th, President Lamson acknowledged Past Presidents, distinguished visitors, members of the Governance and Bylaws Committee and society staff who were in attendance.

OLD BUSINESS:

The board approved minutes of the October 2010 meeting.

Treasurer's Report - Dwayne Cooper, Treasurer

- •Fiscal Year 2010 was completed with a net income from operations of \$470,931 against a breakeven budget.
- •The board empowered the CEO to obtain a commitment for refinancing the mortgage on Harmony Hall.
- •Liquidity requirement of \$1.5 million is met and exceeded with approx \$2.3 million in unrestricted cash and equivalents.

Global Policy Task Force - Ed Watson, reporting for Chairman Keil

The chair wants to see more push from the World Harmony Council toward establishing affiliates.

Youth In Harmony

■he Las Vegas Mid-Winter Convention saw two Dixie District Youth Choruses in the 4nd Annual International Youth Chorus Festival. Cleveland, Tennessee and Savannah, Georgia both sponsored choruses. Many of these young singers are familiar with barbershop through our summer Harmony Explosion Camps. Harmony Foundation and the Dixie District both help supplement the

expenses for these groups. If you get the chance, be sure to support and encourage these young men. It appears, at this writing, that there will be 19 youth choruses with over 600 young singers in this competition.

Thanks to the Marietta Big Chicken Chorus should be noted for their

support of the Savannah Storm Youth Chorus, who appeared on all three of the Big Chicken's recent Christmas shows.

A one-day festival for high school boys and girls in the North Georgia area was sponsored by the Atlanta Vocal Project. It was held January 22 in Calhoun, Georgia. Clinicians were Clay and Becki Hine, and teaching quartets were Lunch Break and Last Minute. Information is available on www. AtlantaVocalProject.com.

Again in 2011, the Dixie District will provide a Harmony Explosion Camp in Huntsville, Alabama. This will be a three day camp at the University of Alabama, and will be held June 9 -12. Clinicians and quartets will be announced later. More information about this camp will be forthcoming in early 2011. As you know, all

students and educators to this camp are given scholarships, so now would be a good time to prepare your chapter budget to help support them. Harmony Foundation and the Dixie District also contribute to the costs of presenting the camp.

In 2011, the District will again award two or more music educator scholarships to attend Harmony University in St. Joseph, Missouri. This is a great way to make teachers aware of the benefits of introducing barbershop into their music programs. If you would like to nominate a music teacher for a 2011 District scholarship to HU, send to me the following by March 31: a nomination letter, a copy of the teachers resume, and a statement assuring that the teacher can attend. The dates of Harmony University in 2011 are July 24 through the 31st.

Your Dixie District Board of Directors recently approved a Youth In Harmony 2011 budget that will also allow financial assistance for up to two College Quartet competitors in Philadelphia, and two one-day Festivals. Funds to help with funding exhibits at two Music Educator Conventions were also approved.

If your chapter puts on a one-day Youth Festival in your area, you may be eligible for funds from Harmony Foundation as well. "Festivals" can include just about any barbershop teaching experience, which can receive up to \$1000 in a grant from Harmony Foundation. Let me know the details of your event so that I can check this out for you. And if your Chapter is sponsoring a booth at an MENC Convention, you need to let me know.

Some Ways to Build Quartets in Your Chapter

One of the greatest ways to get singers in your chapter excited about wanting to sing in a quartet is to provide them with as many opportunities that you can. There are many chapters that do just that by having quartets form from their chorus so they can sing for their performances, cabarets, and annual shows. We're not just talking about their established quartets, but chapter quartets put together specifically for these shows.

To get the quartet program started, the music leadership team might pick four voices that they feel might sound good together. Trained ears sometimes can do a better iob of this than four untrained guys.

The quartet could sing a Polecat song or something from your chapter's current repertoire. If the quartet doesn't want to sing a song from the chorus's current repertoire, they could use voice-dominant learning tapes to learn another song. The idea is to give the fledging foursome all the help-

Their coaching can come from experienced quartet singers. This coaching can take place before, at break, or after chapter meeting. The coaching could even happen another evening during the week.

aids they need to be successful.

Many chapters use quartets in their performances as a part of their performance package. There are also songs a chorus sings that provide an opportunity for a quartet to sing a part. What a great way to start an introduction of a song; create a beautiful mood in a bridge section or the beginning of the

repeat. All these uses can be done effectively and add variety to a chorus's performances package.

Can you imagine how much more variety you'll have in each performance and how much better the chorus will sing because of this practice?

Our Society's Singing Valentine program is one of the greatest programs to get singers involved in doing a quartet activity. One successful way that many chapters do to get their quartet program off the ground is to have the entire chorus learn three or four appropriate songs. They then ask their singers to put together combinations for the two or three day program. Some of the basses and baritone can sing falsetto to learn the tenor part, so they have enough parts for the quartets. Once again, having a music team and/or an established musical talent in the chorus available for coaching is a real assistance to these aspiring quartets. The more members performing in quartets the better your chorus sound will be.

Another opportunity for quartet development is having a novice quartet activity of some kind in your division or area. It can come in many forms such as a "So You Wanna to be in a Quartet?" workshop, or a Novice Quartet Contest/Festival in your chapter, division, or district.

Just think of the advantages of being a part of any one of these opportunities to sing or become a part of a barbershop quartet. They would be:

- •Discussing the voice ranges of each part finding out you could sing more than one part.
- •Finding out what each part should do to allow the quartet to be most successful.
- •Learning how to sing with three other guys.
- •Feeling the joy of singing with three other guys.

- •Finding out you can sing your part by yourself.
- •Finding different rehearsal techniques that can help you be your best.
- •Finding out the many roles quartet members need to take for the quartet to be successful.
- •Finding out about the different kinds of coaching available to quartets.
- •Finding out how to ask a qualified coach to work with your quartet.
- •Finding out how to get voice-dominant learning tapes, CD's and music for your quartet.
- •Finding out how to get along.

You can't go wrong when you go to an event that is promotion quartetting You meet many Barbershoppers who are interested in singing four part harmony just like you. Singing in a quartet gives you so many more opportunities to perform than singing in a chorus. Four guys and a pitch pipe . . . that's all it takes. Doing chapter shows and performances around your community is a lot of fun. The greatest part of this is that there are singers in your chapter right now that don't know the thrill of singing in a barbershop quartet. They don't know what it's like to ring a chord with three other guys. They've had the opportunity to feel it with a chorus, but it's so much different when you are the guy singing the part that makes the four of you sound so good.

The next time you're at a show, a chapter meeting, or barbershop get together, ask the guys around you to sing a tag or a song anytime you get the chance, you won't regret it. You just might be on your way to finding three other guys who'll want to sing in a barbershop quartet just like you do. Wouldn't that be a heck of a deal!

interest in working with youth, please let your Chapter administration know. Also contact me, so that I can help you establish a program for your chapter.

Barbershoppers connected with any youth activities such as quartet contests, festivals, work-shops, etc. are now required to conform to special insurance requirements regarding sexual harassment training. It is very important that I know of all youth activities that your Chapter plans, and who your YIH person is, so that this information can be sent to the proper person.

Society Youth 1 and Youth 2 membership plans are still in effect. A new member under the age of 26 pays only an enrollment fee of \$10 for their first year (unless your chapter charges them dues). Thereafter, and for returning members under the age of 26, they pay ½ Society and \$10 Dixie District dues. Take advantage of these rates and bring young members into your Chapter.

On the weekend of September 10 through 12 the Confederate Harmony Brigade held their annual Rally at the Chattanooga Choo Choo Hotel in Tennessee. In all, about 70 Brigade members and guests attended for a weekend of fellowship & singing. As in most all Rallies, a Saturday night show, hosted by the Choo Choo Chorus, was greeted with thunderous applause by the appreciative audience in attendance. The guest quartet, The Real McCoy, out of Nashville, wowed the audience with

their own blend of close harmony, with a splash of humor. Loose Change, another Dixie District quartet, displayed their unique brand of 4-part comedy as well with a different take on legal issues.

The Choo Choo Chorus filled the first half of the show with a

river boat flavor of chorus and quartet numbers and then, in the second half, the Confederate Harmony Brigade Chorus blasted the auditorium with their 70-man sound and a finale that was both heartwarming and spectacular. Complete with a slide presentation, the combined choruses sang Clay Hine's arrangement of "America The Beautiful" in tribute to those who died nine years ago on September 11, as well as all those who are or have served our country in all branches of service. By the end, there wasn't a dry eye in the house and the entire audience stood in tribute to the theme and the chorus members.

One of the main highlights of the Brigade Rally was the presentation of a sword to the retired Commanding General, Jim Sams, from the Memphis Chapter. It has

2010 Standing Ovation Program

The Dixie District Standing Ovation Program provides an opportunity for your chorus and quartets to be evaluated in their public performance presentations. 2010 has been a great year for our District's Standing Ovation Program, as we have been able to meet all requests.

This is a voluntary, confidential program.

Results are not reported to the Society, any of its committees, or anyone else. The evaluation is strictly between the chorus or quartet being evaluated and the trained reviewer.

The performers would Sherwood Platt prepare for a review with a 20 to 40 minute presentation reflecting the group's typical

performance or have the reviewer attend a rehearsal or an actual show.

The review would include consideration of the music selected, the quality of singing, musicality and presentation in the barbershop (or other) style, song sequencing for entertaining flow, non-singing comments related to the master of ceremonies, scripted dialogue, set design, venue, stage presence, including entrance and exit skills, costuming, grooming and overall entertainment value.

If the performance is not given in a theater setting, detailed explanations of technical matters such as lighting, sound, microphones, and anything else related to the presentation should be explained to the evaluator. The review will include suggestions and resources

that may be of help to improve your public performance.

After receiving a request from a chapter chorus or quartet, a Standing Ovation Program reviewer is assigned; the visit is scheduled at a mutually convenient time. The cost to the chapter consists of two complimentary tickets to the performance and any hospitality they wish to provide; reviewer travel expenses are reimbursed by the District.

Gary Parker gave the report on behalf of committee members Paul Wietlisbach and Doug Brown, both of whom were in attendance.

Immediate task is to develop an appropriate program for the spring board meeting.
Currently looking to bring in someone to present a case study on an organizational turn-around.

Two Year chorus Rotation Update - Ed Watson, CEO

- •District Presidents generally do not support
- Discussion has practically faded to nothing
- •The two-year chorus discussion, as originally discussed, will not be pursued
- Some districts are asking to convert C&J rules to allow prelims in one contest per year
- •The most recent suggestion which has been tentatively supported by C&J Committee is to consider the spring only prelims.
- •There is no recommendation pending for the board at this time but Ed will continue to work with the District Presidents and the appropriate committees and keep the board informed.

Board Job Descriptions – Jim Sams, Committee Chair

Jim Sams gave the report for task force members Ted Devonshire and Chris Buechler (with assistance from Alan Wile, Greg Caetano, and Rod Sgrignoli). Existing documents were retrieved, reviewed and promulgated in pdf format to Governance and Bylaws for committee review. Proposed Job Descriptions were presented to the board, amended, and approved.

Membership Growth Task Force Mini Task Force Reports - Bill Biffle, MGTF Chair

All Ages Task Force – Jack Fitzpatrick, Chair

"Montana Jack" Fitzpatrick gave the report for task force members Charlie Davenport, David R. Updegraff, Mike Stoll, and James Estes. (Bob Fichtner, Special Consultant). The report presents significant statistical evidence of the challenge we currently face in membership. There are specific recommendations for both recruiting and retention detailed in the report.

Delivery Mechanism Task Force – John Donehower, Chair

John Donehower gave the report for task force members Christian Hunter, Greg Caetano, Mike Scott, and Andrew Shackleton. The primary focus is to develop a system to provide a solid foundation for cost/benefit analysis for all new membership programs proposed. The secondary focus is to develop a methodology of making available contemporary training tools for chapters to use in pursuing membership growth programs at the local level.

New Chapters Task Force - Don Fuson, Chair

Don Fuson gave the report for task force members Rob MacDonald, Steve Zorn, Pete Carentz, and Rick Spencer. Don read a list of new licenses and asked the DPs from those districts to stand and be recognized. Overwhelming feedback was that nearly all new chapters were formed by someone who knew barbershop and made it happen. The report will also include a retroactive review of the past, specifically during a more successful chapter proliferation era.

External Focus Task Force - Gary Parker, Chair

Gary Parker gave the report for task force members Brandon Guyton, John Miller, Mike Lietke, and Melanie Chapman. The current list of potential initiatives is up to 18 and is currently being sorted into the following five categories:

- already in progress (no brainers)
- •soon to begin (quick hits)
- •higher priority long term
- •lower priority long term
- •drop from the list

Solutions focus on low cost technology. 15 initiatives being considered such as:

- •Chapter Show and Recruiting tools consolidated in an easy to find location on the web site
- •Use headline quartets (former gold medalists) to help market the show and to recruit
- •Social Media approaches to enhance recruiting
- •Video on Demand cable channel dedicated to barbershop harmony
- •Expand the CDD program to provide more marketing and resources to attract external talent to increase the current talent pool of highly qualified directors (both recruiting and retention)
- Push vs pull communications technology

Strategic Planning Task Force - Noah Funderburg

Noah Funderburg gave the report for task force members Ed Watson and Shannon Elswick. Noah told the group that his father's tools were not clean and pretty, that is because the tools were well used and used well. He admonished that the board cannot let all this work just be pretty and gather dust. Noah encouraged the total group that this is our proverbial Sputnik moment and challenged everyone to convert our research into passion and action.

Governance and Bylaws Report

Youth in Harmony recommendations:

Changed minimum score from 70 to 71 for qualifying for CBQC contest in 2011 Accepted recommendation that only 1 past CBQC or BHS champion per quartet be allowed beginning in 2012.

Society Contest Rules

Codified the current practice off having the SCJC Chairman serve as the Panel Chairman for the International Contest.

Affirmed the priority order of audience, contestant, then panel for resolving environmental issues at contests. This is the practice which has previously been followed but is now formalized in the rules.

Subsidiary Requests

Three requests for subsidiary organizations were reviewed. The one for the High Sierra Harmony Brigade was approved.

Other Committees:

Reports were received from the Honorary Membership Committee and the Ethics Committee. The board discussed and provided input for the Nominating Committee.

CEO Report - Ed Watson, CEO

The society finished in the black for 2010

Mid Winter 2011 has sold out twice and the same day ticket sales are very strong

Increased revenue associated with increased ticket sales

Convention expenses are going to be up as well so it is hard to tell how the bottom line will be

Executive limitations were all met

Final 2009 audit has been completed and will be sent to the board

Discussion of process related to tracking and monitoring the number of chapters with less than 12 members

Update on world harmony development per the newest executive limitation

Spanish Association of Barbershop Singers ready to affiliate

Bing (Barbershoppers in Germany) is making two song books, one for men and one for women, and they are thrilled with the support of the staff

Combined Meeting of the Society Board and the District Presidents

Jim Warner, Chair of Governance and Bylaws Committee, gave a briefing on the various issues of organization and the documents which have the information most often requested.

Alan Lamson described the role of the Society Board and how that has evolved over the years, especially since 2005 when the Carver Governance Model was adopted. He talked about the use of executive limitations and how that led to the formation of the Operations Team (OT). Alan described the form, structure and process of the original OT and how that led to shrinking the number of people actually on the OT. The Society Board has taken a slightly larger slice of the society pie since forming the MGTF and input from and collaboration with the District Presidents is more important than ever. Alan looks at the current governance model, six years after the change, as an evolution.

Pete Carentz gave a presentation to the group suggesting some language be added to the operations manual to better describe the role of the District Presidents as related to the governance function of the barbershop harmony society. Ed Watson agreed to make the changes as requested.

Regarding the Strategic Planning Task Force recommendation for chapter visitation, the following agreements were reached:

- •CSLT Committee will design a set of questions for the chapter visits and have them ready to be submitted to the district presidents by Feb 15th
- •The questions should be finalized by the district presidents by March 1st
- •Chapter visits should be 66 percent completed by Aug 31
- •Chapter visits should be 100 percent completed by Dec 31

The meeting was recessed until the following morning.
