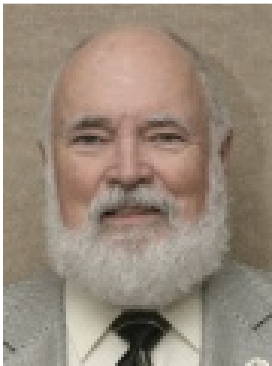

Full Page: 10 x 3 1/4	\$100.00

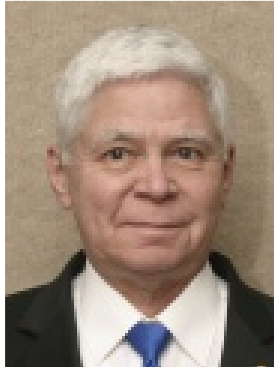

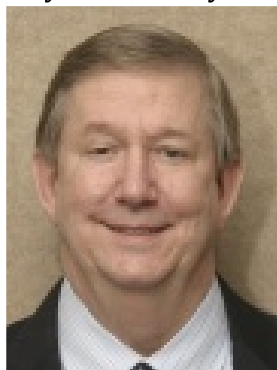

DIXIE District BOARD LIAISON REPORT by Jim Sams, Society Board Member-at-Large Society Board of Directors Meeting Summary July 4-5, 2011, in Kansas City

The meeting began with singing of the American and Canadian national anthems and "The Old Songs", reading of the Society's mission and vision statements, specific Board member responsibility appointments for the meeting, introduction of guests and visitors, approval of March, April, and May Board meeting minutes, and formal receipt of Operations Team and Board committee and task force reports.

Treasurer's Report: While Midwinter profits exceeded budget, Kansas City International registrations are expected to be 300 under budget, even though initially budgeted registrations were significantly lower than the final Philadelphia count. Projected KC net income is \$250,000 vs. budget of \$362,000. Revised 2011 net income projection is a loss of \$236,000, which includes \$296,000 of non-cash

depreciation, so positive cash flow is still expected.

Recognizing the low mortgage rate environment and a balloon payment due in March 2012 on our existing HQ building loan, we are planning to refinance \$1.2 million during the third quarter of 2011.

Old Business:

- Ed Watson reported that District Presidents (DPs) have decided to continue spring conventions in their present form for the time being.

- The Board Annual Planning Cycle Committee (APCC) reviewed proposed changes to the Society CEO's aims for 2012 and beyond.

Further revisions will be made for approval at the fall meeting.

- The President's special task force to study the impact on the Society of the "permanent guests" some chapters are having recommended no response or action.

- EVP Shannon Elswick assigned Board members to attend district fall HOD meetings as Board Representatives, distinguishing those from separately assigned "Board Liaisons" to assigned districts.

New Business:

- The Board approved the appointment of Interim Executive Director Larry Deters.

- The Society President's Management and Finance Task Force reported progress on developing final recommendations regarding improved communication, cash and debt management, financial status, and relationships between the Society and Harmony Foundation.

- A new CEO position description for recruiting purposes was approved. The CEO Search Team should be in place the week of 8/7 and I will let you know who is on the team as soon as I receive the charge from Alan Lamson.

- The Board approved a recommendation to pursue a website document organization plan.

- The Board approved Society affiliation of the

Spanish Association of Barbershop Singers (SABS).

- A proposal to schedule the fall board meeting in conjunction with the mini-forum in Dallas was considered and has been approved.

- The new Comcast video-on-demand cable Barbershop channel was demonstrated and should be available soon.

- Existing Board officers (President Lamson, EVP Elswick, Treasurer Cooper, IPP Biffle) were elected for an additional one-year term for 2012.

- New board members Joe Cerutti and Gary Plaag were elected effective 1/1/12 to replace Gary Parker and Ted Devonshire who are completing their three-year terms 12/31/11.

District Presidents' Council: The Board met jointly with the DP Council, receiving presentations on the new Operation Harold Hill starting 1/1/12 and the Society board member election process. There was also an open forum of discussion on a variety of topics.

The Board meeting adjourned with the singing of "Keep the Whole World Singing".

Have you ever wondered if the audience applauded or stood because they were glad it was over? As usual, family and friends congratulate you on the performance. You might suppose that they didn't notice a few things that didn't go as expected. Wouldn't it be wonderful if you knew someone with Barbershop Harmony theater experience who you could trust to tell you the honest, unvarnished truth about what was presented on stage?

The Dixie District Standing Ovation Program provides an opportunity for your chorus and quartets to receive an honest appraisal of your performance.

This is a voluntary, confidential program. Results are not reported to the Society, its committees, or anyone else. The evaluation is strictly between the chorus or quartet being evaluated and the trained reviewer. You can request a review of either the rehearsal or the actual show.

Dixie District Standing Ovation Program Reviewers are individuals who have Barbershop Harmony experience in theater and performance. Their review and evaluation is intended to improve your performance for a public presentation, not on how your performance would be judged on the International Barbershop Harmony Contest Stage. You can expect honest, friendly, supportive ideas and suggestions to make your group look and sound better.

Reviewers consider the music selected and the quality of singing and presentation in barbershop or some other style. You'll also receive comments and suggestions related to the master of ceremonies, entrance and exit skills, scripted dialogue, set design, venue, staging, costuming, grooming, and overall entertainment value of the event.

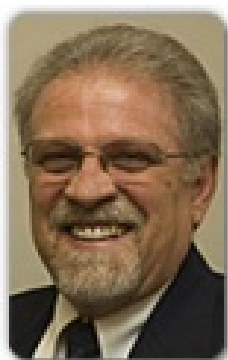
If the evaluation performance is not given in a theater setting, detailed explanations of technical matters such as lighting, sound, microphones, and everything else related to the presentation should be explained to the evaluator. The review will include suggestions and resources that may be helpful in improving your public performance.

After receiving a request from a chapter chorus or quartet, a Standing Ovation Program reviewer is assigned and scheduled for a mutually convenient time. The cost to the chapter consists of two complimentary tickets to the performance and any hospitality the members wish to provide. Reviewer travel expenses are reimbursed by the District.

Contact me if you are interested in having a Standing Ovation Program review of your performance or if you would you like information on becoming a reviewer.

How Speaking Incorrectly Can Make Your Singing Voice Suffer

If you ever tried to talk on a phone all day or talk over the din of factory/office noises and then tried to do a quartet performance/chorus rehearsal that evening, then this article is for you. I bet you have found it is often not the easiest thing to do. Here are some tips on how to handle this problem.

or even polyps.

If you sing lead or tenor, then you need to speak at a higher pitch and sound like one. You cannot speak in a lazy low voice for too long before your voice will start getting tired. When talking you must also learn to speak with the same focus and support you do when you properly sing.

You need to speak in your “mean” range. That “mean” range is usually a fifth higher than the lowest quality note you can sing in your range. Another way to determine your speaking pitch is to say hello with enthusiasm to a friend.

When I started teaching high school I could sing all day, but I would be hoarse if I spoke for less than an hour. Then I read an article in the Journal of the American Medical Association that stated

After a performance or talking all day, you don’t have the luxury of putting your voice away or just stop talking to rest it. Your voice is always on call and this can lead to vocal problems such as tiredness or even hoarseness. Furthermore, if you have poor speaking habits, you might be headed down the road to some serious vocal abuse such as persistent vocal-fold nodules

that many sopranos and tenors were ruining their voices because they did not know how to speak correctly. The article suggested strongly that you need to speak in the range you sing. Furthermore, you needed to speak with the same good techniques you do when you sing your very best.

The result will be that you will be very happy with your voice after a long day on the job when you perform that evening in your barbershop quartet.

Convention Registration Costs To Increase In Spring

Since we became a smaller District, your District convention team has sought to continue to provide cost-effective conventions in cities with quality hotels, contest venues, etc. That has become increasingly difficult since the District was split in half. For example, we could not provide transportation for choruses at this spring's convention in Boaz, AL and everyone had to drive from the hotels to the contest venue. We will have chorus transportation available in Chattanooga next month, and the distance from the hotel to the venue will not be as great. However, it is a constant battle as to whether we will have to cut some services from our budget from convention to convention.

With this in mind, the District Board, after much research and discussion, has decided to increase convention registration costs, beginning with the Spring 2012 convention in Gadsden, AL. The "early-bird" registration cost will increase to \$39/person and late registration to \$49/person. Based on research the convention team did into other Districts' convention registration costs, we found that Dixie's registration prices were among the lowest in the Society. Here are some important benefits of this increase:

1. It will bring us more toward the "average" registration price and will, more importantly, allow us to provide the same convention services, if not better, that we enjoyed before the District split.
2. It will help us to search for the best possible contest venues for our competitors, as well as quality hotels which will have facilities for hospitality rooms and will be close to the venue, etc.
3. It will allow us to do more long-range convention planning and solidify future contracts with hotels, auditoriums, etc.
4. It will allow us to search for possible locations within the District geographic region which may have never hosted a District convention and may be more attractive destinations for our members.
5. It will allow us to provide more financial help to our chorus and quartet representatives to International competitions.
6. It will continue to allow us to provide the best possible lighting and sound equipment for our competitions.

We certainly do not want to place an undue financial burden on any of our members; however, we believe that this is a reasonable increase for convention registrations. We want everyone to enjoy every aspect of the convention experience, and we will continue to do the best we can to make that possible.

Dixie continues to be one of the strongest Districts in the Society musically and administratively. We want to strengthen it even more by giving our competitors and convention attendees the best possible experience and accommodations. We look forward to an even greater future in this great District!

The Biggest Little (Busiest) New Chorus in Dixie

In mid-2009, nine men set out with a vision of creating a new chapter, beginning a journey that would lead to the creation of Dixie's newest chapter. Located just outside of Memphis, TN in Germantown, these men made up the nucleus of what recently became chapter B-104.

Named the RSVP Chorus, the board quickly decided that our best bet for recruiting and making known our intentions was to perform. Having served as Membership VP in the past, I knew from experience that the best recruiting tool was singing, and doing it well! With that in mind, we began, even before we

chartered, learning a repertoire of songs and creating a brand name for ourselves that was unique to this area.

RSVP, in 2010-2011, has performed in over 23 gigs, including being guest performers on our sponsor chapter's show (Memphis), and being the guest chorus for Memphis' Sweet Adeline Chapter show. With more gigs on the books and requests coming in regularly, RSVP has become quite literally one of the busiest choruses in Dixie.

The secret? -- well, there isn't one really. I'd like to say it was the culmination of a good plan coming together. We decided to build a repertoire of songs that audiences were more likely to identify with. We built those songs

into a flowing, scripted show that highlighted the group's talents as well as the two quartets in our ranks, and wham, we were an instant hit! Instead of performing evenly spaced in rows, we varied our stance on stage, loosened up a bit and brought a sense of relaxation to our audience. When your audience is relaxed, you can feel it, and it makes singing so much easier.

Lastly, I'm sure you are wondering about the name RSVP. Well, it's simple. First and foremost, as much as we tried to become the Robert Strong Vocal Project, in honor of our president, Robert was not having it! So, we decided we were best served by including our goals/mission, into our name. Keep it simple right? RSVP traditionally translates to "please respond." We thought about that, and well, that's exactly what we want people to do when they hear and see us. More thought followed along that path, and well, we think we found our identity:

R- Relationships. Striving to build and maintain them with our members and the community.
S- Sound Singing. In pursuit of musical excellence.
V- Variety. The spice of life right?
P- Passion. For the Society we love and the music we represent.

It's really that simple. Our mission and our goals are contained therein.
