



Youth In Harmony

North Georgia, In there are a number of high schools that have had a close relationship with Youth In Harmony programs over the past ten years. There have been several one day festivals, Harmony Explosion camps, combined shows with AVP, quartet contest participation, youth chorus festival participation, and

teachers attending Harmony College and University on scholarships. It should have been no surprise when several of these teachers came to me at the 2014 Harmony Explosion Camp suggesting that a great way to get barbershop exposure at other schools in Georgia would be to hold an ice cream social at the Georgia Music Educators Association All-State Chorus event in Athens in early March. This event is attended by just about every teacher with a successful vocal music program, as well as many of the state's best choral music students.

The suggestion was taken, and planning began. The students' busy rehearsal schedules left little flexibility, but it turned out that a Thursday night hour would fit. That happened to be the night that AVP normally rehearses. After some concessions on costs and catering, we arranged to hold the social in a space adjacent to the students' rehearsal rooms. How convenient is that?

With the help of a grant from Harmony Foundation, invitations to attend a barbershop workshop and enjoy a free ice cream and cookie treat went out to several hundred All-State choral students, as well as to more than thirty music educators who had expressed an interest in knowing more about barbershop. Over 180 attended. They watched videos of some of barbershop's best quartets and choruses and heard explanations and demonstrations of the style by Dave Fobart. Loop 10, the Dixie District's College Quartet Champions, sang a couple of songs for them, as did Vox quartet. Clay Hine taught several tags to the group, and AVP performed a few of their Disney songs.

The teachers that suggested the event addressed the group and gave their endorsements, and Tim Sharp, the Executive Director of the National ACDA, who was at-(see YIH on page 4)

Already, I can see positive results from this event as registrations come in for the 2015 Harmony Explosion camp from new schools and from teachers who attended the event.

Each state in our District has a similar All-State Chorus event each year, and there is an opportunity to present barbershop at these. If you have an interest in this type of event and would like help in organizing it, please let me know.

Speaking of the HX Camp, it will be July 16 – 19 at the University of Tennessee, Chattanooga. This year, the dorms will be ones that are considered the best on the campus. The camp will again be co-ed, and the clinicians are Clay and Becki Hine, and Dusty Schleier. The teaching quartets for the girls will be Ballistic! from Atlanta, and for the boys, The Academy, 2014 International College Quartet Champions from Florida and Texas. The Saturday night show will be one that you will not want to miss,



so please plan to attend at least that. If you can attend the entire camp as a teacher, singer, or chaperone, get your registration in soon. Forms and other information are on the Dixie website. Harmony Foundation and the Dixie District help to pay for the camp, so thank you for your help. Student fees this year are set at \$100.

There were no nominations this year for the music educator scholarships to attend Harmony University in Nashville. Keep this in mind for next year. This is a great way to make teachers aware of the benefits of introducing barbershop into their music programs.

2014 Leadership Forum Executive Summary & Vision for 2015 By Danny Rose, Director of Harmony University, Barbershop Harmony Society

On November 1- 3, 2014 at the Airport Marriott, the Society hosted 80 leaders at the 2014 Leadership Forum- We sing. We serve. We had representatives from 15 of our 17 districts. Twenty-five of these men were invited as "future leaders" with districts grooming these men for foreseeable leadership roles with the Society. We were also excited to be joined by Society current and future Board members for meals and shared singing activities. We brought in six facilitators with special skills in leadership, secretary or treasurer skills, and finally nine Harmony Hall staff to help with direct facilitation or onsite event logistics with both the forum and board meetings.

Because we are administrators from a singing organization, planners worked at connecting parables from our music world to leadership: everyone has stood in front of a conductor and understands the need for this leadership role. Facilitators directed the group to teach songs and concepts, always bringing it back to district leadership principles. Eye contact and body language result in a better product. Positive modeling, sharing skills, small group work can elevate the group much faster and higher than an executive style leader. After our singing culture was established, we referenced our founders' mandate to give back to the community. Giving back to the community was so important to our leaders like OC Cash, Rupert Hall, and Dr. Val Hicks, that they included this mandate in our Code of Ethics on the back of our membership cards:

We shall render all possible altruistic service through the medium of barbershop harmony.

For years the Society and its members have allowed the focus of the majority of its time and efforts to be on singing, performing and competing. It is understandable as it is easier to focus inwardly on ourselves rather than engaging the broader communities in which we live. The renewed strategic vision for the organization continues to celebrate these long held traditions and strive for excellence through competitions. Equally importantly, however, this strategic vision returns us to our roots to emphasize one of the best kept secrets of the organization: serving others.

We serve others through song, through good deeds, through helping hands, through fundraising, and much more. The BHS Leadership of today, tomorrow and the future must think differently, act differently. They must encourage and cultivate the dual nature of the organization's strategic focus in order to build its long term success.

Simply put, we need to ensure that at every level of our Society, we and others outside our organization, connect us to a simplified purpose: we sing, we serve, we bring joy to each other. This is who we are; what guides us. This is what enriches us, makes us feel good. This is what separates us from other organizations, what keeps us coming back and what attracts others to join. This is what we need to tell others we're all about.

<u>HIGHLIGHTS</u>

- Singing at the start of each session in a 100 man chorus that was good!
- 2013 goals achieved with chapter connections...it's working!
- Many of our leaders have already purchased our homework book (Good to Great) for chapter presidents in their home districts!
- Starting each session with a merchandise giveaway of new Barbershop clothing...if you arrived on time!
- Our <u>WE SING</u> bus of 45 went out in the community and sang:
 - Inside a restaurant on a stage at ACME feed and seed.
 - Outside on a street corner where onlookers would stop and smile.
 - On a rooftop, singing down to people walking by on Broadway.
- Our <u>WE SERVE</u> bus of 35 of us went out and removed huge mounds of debris from a watershed, returning it to a pristine state. The folks at Hands Around Nashville were our contact, and were very excited to have our help!
- Saturday Night Keynote address: Donny Rose connecting 10 leadership principles to barbershop singing.
- Collaboration between district officers to share best practices.
- Strong positive reaction to Jim Collins "Good to Great and the social sectors" book.
- Direct instruction for all attendees on required job descriptions.
- Video recording of Secretary track training. This will be available online for every secretary in the society.
- Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's) were generated and recorded, and will be available for all district officers
- District leaders had time to collaborate with other districts on best practices, problems, and solutions to take back home.
- District leaders were also grouped in home districts to plan a scorecard to set goals and a way to measure if they achieved these goals and programs when they return home, with a support group from both BHS and other districts.
- The hotel staff was very easy to work with and exceeded expectations, including food service, WIFI for all our people staying at the hotel, and all our technology needs on site.
- Down time at night to share, collaborate, network, and sing.
- Interaction between board and district leaders.

- Marty Monson closing out Sunday night with offering project management help and training. Headquarters will pay for Basecamp for each district for 3 years, and will re-evaluate effectiveness in 2017.
- 100% of our respondents felt that Nashville is a great location for the forum.
- Marty will provide a 2014 executive summary letter of 2014 results prior to the end of the year to all chapter presidents/boards demonstrating the collective successes already captured via the CVP activities over the past year.

Central Alabama Hosts Directors' Workshop by Frank Holmes

On Saturday, May 16, the Dixie District of the Barbershop Harmony Society held a Chorus Directors' Workshop Intensive (CD-WI) in Birmingham, AL. Hosted by the Central Alabama chapter, chorus director trainers Raisha Quinn from Grand Junction, Colorado and John Devine from Houston, Texas spent the day intensely working with five chorus directors to strengthen their directing skills. The morning was spent in interviews and discussions with the directors. In the afternoon, the directors were able to work with a live chorus to practice their directing skills and to be coached by the trainers. They were videoed and had the chance to view their recordings with the trainers after their session.
